At the Kentucky Arts Council, we believe that the arts thrive where communities do — and there is no better place to grow and create than right here in the commonwealth.

Our New Kentucky Home offers more than just scenic beauty and cultural richness, it offers opportunity. Our state is a place where business support is not just a promise — it's a practice. From small startups to major employers, Kentucky fosters an environment where entrepreneurs and creatives alike are encouraged to succeed.

The arts are especially vital in Kentucky, deeply rooted in our heritage and essential to our future. As public funding in other areas faces reduction, Gov. Andy Beshear has stated clearly: Kentucky will do what it can to help make up the difference. That commitment underscores the importance of protecting and expanding the role of the arts in every corner of our state.

The economic impact is clear. Tourism in the commonwealth is a \$14.3 billion industry, and our arts industry generates \$6.5 billion in economic impact and supports more than 50,000 jobs. We're proud to be part of a state that prioritizes workforce development, ensuring that both established professionals and the next generation have the tools and training they need to excel. The Creative Industry Summit Series offers free professional development for artists, and the KYArtsCast podcast — relaunched in fall 2024 expands our reach through digital storytelling. Significant growth across our social media platforms continues to increase awareness and visibility for Kentucky's creative sector.

Our grant programs — including the Kentucky Arts Partnership, Folk and Traditional Arts Apprenticeships, and America 250KY — provide essential funding that fuels nonprofit operations, public art projects, cultural preservation, and more. These investments help ensure the arts remain a visible, vital part of life in every region of the state.

The arts are also a bipartisan investment. In Kentucky, the arts strengthen education, tourism, workforce development, and small business growth. Gov. Andy Beshear and the Kentucky General Assembly have demonstrated bold leadership by supporting the arts through significant state investment. But state dollars alone are not enough. Sustained federal support is essential to complement and reinforce these efforts across our communities.



Governor's Awards in the Arts

Each year, the Governor's Awards in the Arts honor the outstanding achievements of Kentuckians who elevate and enrich the cultural landscape of the commonwealth. The Kentucky Arts Council facilitates the nomination process and ceremony on behalf of the Governor. On November 21, 2024, Governor Andy Beshear joined leaders from the Kentucky Arts Council board and the Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet to recognize nine exceptional recipients representing a spectrum of artistic disciplines and community contributions.

"These awards are a celebration of Kentucky's creative spirit," said Gov. Beshear. "I am honored to recognize the remarkable achievements of this year's award recipients, whose passion for the arts continues to enrich the culture of our new Kentucky home."

The Governor's Awards in the Arts are the highest honor bestowed by the commonwealth in the arts, with categories recognizing artists, organizations, educators, community leaders, and media contributors. Each recipient embodies the vitality of Kentucky's artistic traditions, helping build a thriving arts ecosystem across the state and beyond.

Singer-songwriter **Tyler Childers**, recipient of the National Award, reflected on the honor with gratitude and a deep connection to his Appalachian roots: "Of the many titles I've picked up along the way, one of the titles I'm most proud of is 'Kentucky artist'."



Honorees highlighted the role of the arts in community transformation:

Gregory Turay, celebrated opera singer and executive director of ComposeArts, emphasized the importance of amplifying underrepresented voices: "Through programming, performances, and educational outreach, I am committed to creating platforms that celebrate the contributions of women artists and bring the arts into communities across the state."

Jeffrey Reed, founder of Orchestra Kentucky and recipient of the Community Arts Award, expressed gratitude for recognition of his 25-year journey in building Bowling Green's vibrant arts scene: "One of the reasons we started the orchestra was to help make our home a better place to live."

Carl M. Brashear Radcliff Veterans Center, recipient of the Government Award, was recognized for offering veterans creative opportunities in music, painting and songwriting — arts programs that support healing and community within the center.

County was commissioned to create the custom artworks presented to awardees. Nogami's interdisciplinary practice and advocacy for arts education made her a fitting choice for this year's commemorative pieces.

The Kentucky Crafted Market

In 2024, the Kentucky Crafted Market welcomed more than 10,120 visitors to the Kentucky Horse Park's Alltech Arena over the course of three days — marking the highest attendance in the past 15 years of recorded data and a major milestone for the state's signature art marketplace.

Now in its 41st year, the Market continues to be one of the premier venues in the region for purchasing fine art and craft, connecting Kentucky artists with both retail shoppers and wholesale buyers. This year, 123 artists participated in the show, including 20 first-time exhibitors, with a significant increase in vendor diversity. The 2024 Market welcomed two new Hispanic-owned businesses, four Black-owned businesses, and a marketplace in which half of all participating businesses were women-owned.

Artist feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with many citing record-breaking sales and new business opportunities. One artist reported a \$50,000 wholesale order on opening day. Another noted the weekend's earnings surpassed those of multiple previous shows combined. Worker Bee Sewing Company — recipient of this year's "Best in Show" award — reported thousands in sales per hour on Saturday alone.

The show drew 87 preregistered or onsite wholesale buyers, representing businesses from across Kentucky and states as far as California, Arizona, Kansas, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Ohio. This broad interest demonstrates the ongoing national appeal of Kentucky-made products and reinforces the show's reputation as a significant platform for artists and entrepreneurs.

Special guests and initiatives added to the energy of the weekend:

- A Friday Tourism, Arts, and Heritage Cabinet agency head meeting brought crosssector attention to the event.
- Kentuckians for the Arts (KFTA) hosted an information table at the entrance and encouraged attendees to get the new "arts change lives" license plate from their county clerk's office.
- University of Kentucky Arts Administration students conducted live interviews with artists via Facebook, helping amplify the reach of the show across digital platforms.

The 2024 Market also continued to integrate accessibility and educational outreach, offering music and arts experiences throughout the venue — a return to full programming last seen before the pandemic.

Kentucky Crafted Artists

This year, the Kentucky Arts Council welcomed 24 new artists into Kentucky Crafted, the state's premier arts marketing assistance program. Members gain access to business training, networking, exhibition opportunities, and promotional support, including eligibility to exhibit at the annual Kentucky Crafted Market.

The 2024 artists represent 16 counties across Kentucky, spanning disciplines like painting, fiber, wood, jewelry, ceramics, and more.





Native Reflections

Native Reflections is a traveling exhibit highlighting the visual artwork of American Indians living in Kentucky. Curated through a partnership with the Kentucky Native American Heritage Commission and the Kentucky Heritage Council, the exhibit features artists who identify as Native American — both enrolled and non-enrolled — through ancestry and culture.

The exhibit emphasizes personal storytelling, cultural heritage, and the evolving presence of Native American identity in Kentucky's arts community. Native Reflections opened in the Capitol Rotunda on Oct. 3, 2024, and visited seven venues across the commonwealth throughout 2025, creating space for public dialogue and connection through art.

Creative Industry Summit Series

The Kentucky Arts Council's Creative Industry Summit Series continued with a compelling lineup of virtual events designed to support the professional development of Kentucky artists, arts administrators, and creatives. From design and photography to artist panels and cultural conversations, the series highlighted the wide range of expertise and creativity present in the commonwealth.

JAN 29

Look Sharp! The Key to Well-Produced Printed Material

Even in an increasingly digital world, high-quality printed materials are essential for artists and organizations promoting their work. Graphic designer Ashley Reaves led a 90-minute webinar on the basics of graphic design and print preparation. Participants learned how to present polished, professional pieces—from postcards to posters — by applying foundational design principles and ensuring files are ready for top-quality production.

FEB 29

Look Sharp! Taking and Choosing the Best Promotional Photos

Capturing the energy of performance or the nuance of the creative process can be challenging. This session explored essential photography concepts including lighting, composition, editing, and best practices for working with professionals. Marvin Young, a visual communications professional, drew on his background in photojournalism and public affairs to guide participants in selecting elevated brand imagery.

MARCH 27

Artists to Know: Celebrating Women's (Art)Work

In recognition of Women's History Month, the arts council convened a roundtable featuring six contemporary Kentucky women artists. Moderated by artist and educator Melissa Vandenberg, the conversation explored the motivations, challenges, and creative visions of each panelist. Participating artists included Kate He, Lori Larusso, Alisha Martin, Elizabeth Mesa-Gaido, Tiffany Pyette, and Lakshmi Sriraman.

MAY 22

Artist Talk: Ming Xuan Talley and Yanya Yang

Presented in conjunction with the traveling exhibit Continent to Commonwealth, this live conversation featured Louisville-based artist Ming Xuan Talley and Lexington's Yanya Yang. Both were also commissioned to create portraits for the Kentucky Women Remembered exhibit in the state Capitol. Facilitated by Joel Buno, director of the Asia Institute-Crane House, the talk offered insights into the artists' processes and perspectives as creatives shaping Kentucky's contemporary arts narrative.

The Kentucky Arts Council's podcast, "**KyArtsCast**," returned in October 2024 after a brief hiatus following the departure of longtime host Tom Musgrave. Under the new leadership of host Leeann Potter, "KyArtsCast" continues its mission of spotlighting arts council programs, showcasing Kentucky artists, and addressing issues vital to the commonwealth's creative community. The relaunch reaffirms the arts council's commitment to storytelling and public engagement across digital platforms.

The Kentucky Arts Council also saw significant growth in its social media reach and engagement during 2024. **Facebook** reach increased from 191,000 in the previous year to 4.2 million, with an 88.3% jump in content interactions and a 19.4% increase in published content. The highest-performing post garnered over 50,000 views and 284 interactions.

On **Instagram**, the council published nearly 48% more content than in 2023. Organic engagement remained strong despite a notable reach boost due to advertising around the Kentucky Crafted Market. In total, Instagram reach hit over 1.3 million users, with 31,389 views and 2,000 interactions — an increase of 100% year over year. These numbers reflect the arts council's growing ability to connect with audiences, promote its programs, and support Kentucky artists through compelling, consistent digital storytelling.



Poetry Out Loud



Poetry Out Loud State Champion Lexie Wilson

Eight schools competed in the Poetry Out Loud state competition on March 14, 2024, at the Thomas D. Clark Center for Kentucky History in Frankfort. Poetry Out Loud is an annual poetry recitation contest sponsored by the Kentucky Arts Council, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. In Kentucky, each participating school receives an artists residency and the opportunity for the champion to attend the state competition with a chaperone and classmates.

Each competitor, in the first and second rounds, is judged on the recitation of two poems. Finalists are judged on the recitation of a third poem. All poems are selected by the students and their teachers from a preapproved anthology of works.

Judges were folklorist, poet and educator Sarah McCartt-Jackson, musician and storyteller Mitch Barrett, and Affrilachian poet and NEA Writing Fellowship recipient Jude McPherson.

Lexie Wilson of Williamstown Independent High School was Kentucky's 2024 Poetry Out Loud Champion, and she went on to win runner up in the National 2024 Poetry Ourselves spoken poetry competition for her original poem "My Life is Measured in Shades of Green."

The Kentucky Writers' Day ceremony took place Wednesday, April 24, at the Thomas D. Clark Center for Kentucky History in Frankfort. Kentucky Poet Laureate Silas House was joined by former poets laureate Richard Taylor, Joe Survant, Maureen Morehead, Frank X Walker, George Ella Lyon and Crystal Wilkinson as well as the 2023 Kentucky Youth Poet Laureate Amy Roblero-Perez.

House provided an overview of the first year in his two-year term, characterized by literary engagement and educational outreach. One of House's signature initiatives is **Listen Now! An Oral History Project**, a free K-12 curriculum hosted on the Kentucky Arts Council's website. Inspired by his own upbringing surrounded by elders, House created the project to encourage students to connect with older generations through recorded interviews with family and community members. "The joys and sorrows of the older generations serve as examples for us to learn from, to emulate or, perhaps even more useful, to avoid," House wrote in his introduction to the curriculum.

Beyond the classroom, House has been active across the state and nation. He led a sold-out writing retreat at Cumberland Falls State Resort Park to help celebrate the Kentucky State Parks 100th Anniversary, along with workshops at other state parks. He also gained national attention with a Grammy nomination for his creative role in Tyler Childers' "In Your Love" video.

The celebration continued in the afternoon with a two-hour Kentucky Poets Laureate reading at the Paul Sawyier Public Library in Frankfort. All the poets who attended the Writers' Day event were there along with former poet laureate Jeff Worley. Our partnership with the Paul Sawyier Public Library makes it possible for writers and literature lovers to continue the celebration beyond the Writers' Day ceremony.

Folk and Traditional Arts Apprenticeships

The Folk and Traditional Arts Apprenticeship program honors traditional artists and encourages the continuation of Kentucky's living traditional arts by funding mentor artists to teach skills and practices to less experienced artists. The arts council supported five mentorship pairings, focusing on traditional music, dance and material culture reflecting Kentucky's rich and diverse heritage. The arts council is appreciative of continued support for apprenticeships from Appalachia from South Arts' "In These Mountains" initiative, which preserves and perpetuates the traditional arts and culture of Central Appalachian counties.

Ed White said of the opportunity, "This apprenticeship was life changing, to work with a true artist who is living his mission. He's the fifth generation of woodcarvers in his family and he lives it. The greatest thing is, he's willing to share that with anyone who's willing to work. He has taught me a foundation. He told me, 'Ed, I know that you know what you want to do, and I'm going to show you how to get it out of this wood.'

"Oral tradition is not written down, and you have to go to the mentor to learn it. Once you get it, you have to use it, and my goal is to give it to someone else willing to learn it."

The Community Scholars Program offers training in documentation, interpretation, and dissemination of local cultural heritage. Participants attend sessions over several weeks and, upon certification, become eligible for collaborative projects, fieldwork, and exhibit development. The program strengthens local engagement with Kentucky's folk and traditional arts infrastructure. The training is coordinated by the Kentucky Folklife Program of the Western Kentucky University Department of Society, Culture, Crime and Justice Studies, in partnership with the Kentucky Arts Council.

Over 250 Kentuckians have completed Community Scholar training since 2001. In 2024, the Kentucky Folklife Program worked with advisors to make the training more inclusive and accessible. Results of this process include encouraging trainees to select readings and activities based on their interests and experiences, and presenting training sessions both in-person and online.

From April 13 through July 10, 2024, Southeast Kentucky African-American Museum and Cultural Center in Hazard hosted sessions with Delainey Bowers facilitating. Emily Hudson, director of the Southeast Kentucky African-American Museum and Cultural Center, said, "Community Scholar training was like a giant floodlight shining on the work we are doing. Now, we have a better understanding of folklore and oral history, how they are different, and how they work together like two sides of the same coin."



The Kentucky Arts Council awarded more than \$1.2 million in Kentucky Arts Partnership (KAP) funding to 106 nonprofit arts organizations across the commonwealth. These unrestricted operating support grants help ensure year-round participation in the arts for Kentuckians. Funding is determined through a formula that considers operating revenue, panelist assessments, and funds available.

Gov. Andy Beshear emphasized the importance of this investment: "By investing in the arts, we can help this industry grow and thrive."

KAP recipients provided approximately 3.7 million unique arts experiences in FY2024 and collectively leveraged over \$81 million in additional funding. Organizations ranged in size from grassroots collectives to major cultural institutions.

One of the newest grantees, the Lyric Theatre and Cultural Arts Center in Lexington, used KAP funding to expand outreach: "Thanks to their support, we've been able to reach new communities that had never even heard of the Lyric," said Executive Director Christian Adair.

Disaster Relief, Recovery, and Resilience

In the face of disaster, the Kentucky Arts Council focuses our resources, and leverages those of regional and national partners to provide funds for artists, organizations, and schools with the objectives of helping to restore the well-being of communities and supporting the mental health and sense of belonging for victims experiencing crisis of self, family, community, and place.

The Kentucky Arts Council took counsel from Performing Arts Readiness and the National Coalition of Arts Preparedness and Emergency Response and continued to support those arts and cultural organizations affected by the western Kentucky tornadoes in 2021 and the eastern Kentucky flooding in 2022. To address fatigue, feelings of abandonment, and long-term destabilization, the arts council awarded an additional \$5,000 each in general operating support to the Kentucky Arts Partner groups in the FEMA designated counties.

Ongoing Support

In addition to grant funding, the Kentucky Arts Council supported the creation of "Kentucky Arts in Disaster: An Impact Report," purchased dPlan subscriptions for arts organizations, and provided fee subsidies for organizations to attend a first-ever Arts Disaster & Crisis Preparedness Conference at the University of Kentucky. The KAC is a founding advisor to the new, dedicated response network, Kentucky Heritage Emergency Response Network, which assist arts and culture organizations and artists in crisis and in increasing preparedness.

Teaching Art Together

The Teaching Art Together Grant supports innovative artist residencies in Kentucky classrooms. This year's grant cycle saw strong feedback from peer state agencies, which praised the Kentucky Arts Council's artist residency model as an example worth replicating, and Kentucky teachers advised the KAC on how to better structure residencies to accommodate the needs of preK-12 public school classrooms.



Artists and teachers collaborate on one- to four-week residencies that integrate the arts into the school curriculum. In fiscal year 2024, **Washington County** High School was awarded a \$1,000 grant for teaching artist Yani Vozos to provide a beginning guitar residency.

Library Residency Pilot

The arts council continues to evolve our arts education programs, ensuring they remain responsive to the needs of Kentucky's students, educators, and communities. As federal and state legislation continues to shape the landscape of pre-K-12 education, the Kentucky Arts Council remains committed to offering flexible, meaningful support to schools, classroom teachers, and districts. At the same time, we are expanding our reach by intentionally investing in alternative educational and learning environments. In 2024, the Kentucky Arts Council launched a new artist residency pilot in partnership with public libraries — an initiative designed to test innovative models of community-based arts education.

Three library systems in Appalachian counties — Casey, Madison, and Pike — were awarded \$5,000 each to host KAC teaching artists for residencies held after school and during school breaks. These pilot programs not only support working families and local youth, but also reinforce libraries as vital cultural and educational hubs. Outcomes from these residencies will guide the development of a permanent education grant for launch in fiscal year 2026.

The TranspARTation Grant supports student access to arts field trips. In Fall 2024, the Kentucky Arts Council awarded \$3,762 to seven Kentucky schools to support transportation to high-quality arts venues.

A standout story came from Providence Elementary in Webster County, where a \$1,040 grant allowed K-6 students to attend a musical performance. "The joy on the faces of our students was priceless," said Instructional Coach Elizabeth Warren.

Kentucky Touring Grant

Ten nonprofit organizations were awarded a total of \$21,800 in Kentucky Touring Grants, which provide matching funds to help communities book professional performing artists from the Kentucky Arts Council's Performing Artists Directory.

Events included a concert by Orchestra Kentucky at the Glema Mahr Center for the Arts, where audience members of all ages were deeply moved. Interim Director Brad Downall noted, "Many asked for more programming like this." Performances occurred in libraries, schools, senior centers, and other community spaces, highlighting the program's mission to eliminate barriers to arts access.


